Assignment: When you return from summer break, you will participate in a Collaborative Discussion about the shared short stories and the chosen book(s) you read. Your participation in both assignments will count as a major presentation grade. The following are the requirements for your contribution:

Collaborative Discussion - Short Stories

- Create a plot diagram for **each** story. Accurately label each stage of plot. List the major events of both stories in ascending order. (2 diagrams, total)
- Choose one passage from each text that stands out to you. Write the passage down accurately, including the page number. *Use ONE of the following questions to help you explain why this excerpt is meaningful to you: Does it make you feel a certain way? Is the character’s attitude clearly conveyed? Does this text detail feel out of place?*

Collaborative Discussion - Novels & Lit. Nonfiction/Nonfiction

- Create a plot diagram for your selected novel. Accurately label each stage of plot. List the major events of the novel in ascending order.
- *Choose one event from the book(s) that connects to your life in some way.* In a paragraph, explain to your audience how it connects to your life.
- Assign the book 0-5 stars and explain the book’s strengths and weaknesses.
- Honors/PDP Students: Choose one literary element to analyze from your book(s). Define the element, provide an example of it within the text, and explain how this element impacts the overall narrative.
- Honors/PDP Students: Write a poem that conveys *one* of the central ideas of your literary nonfiction book (reading task #3). The poem must be 8-12 lines and include at least one example of figurative language.
- Extra credit: prepare a poster for your selected novel (reading task #2).
- On the attached slip, supply a parental signature stating that you’ve read the assigned stories and novel over the summer. Turn in the slip to your teacher.

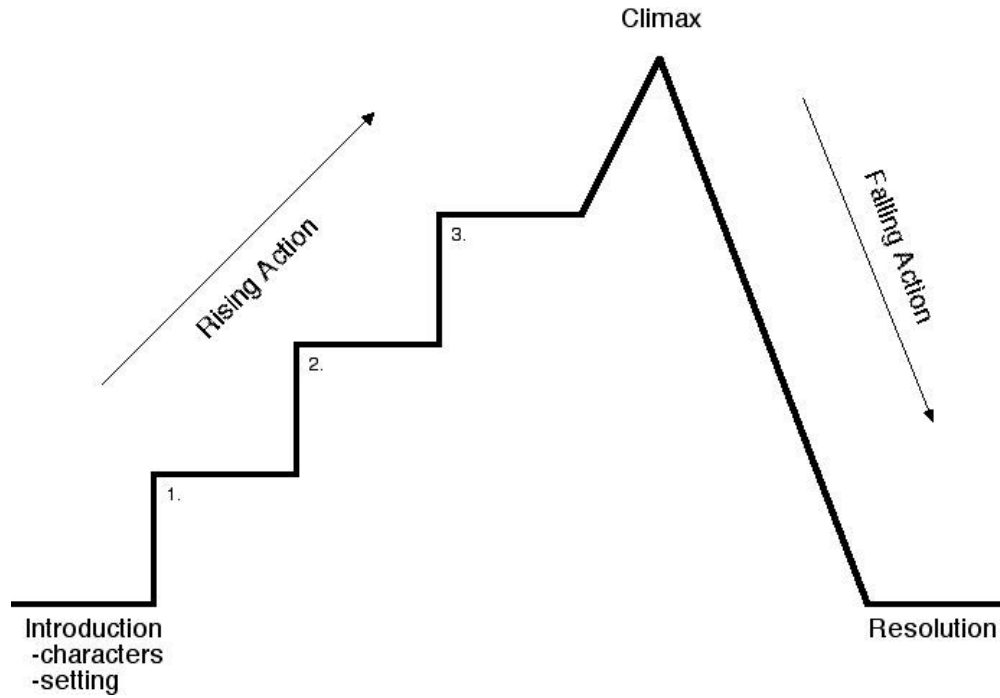
